Ringworm and Head Lice

There have been some cases of ringworm and head lice in Nursery and Reception.

Ringworm

The signs and symptoms, mode of transmission and incubation period are as follows:

<u>Signs and Symptoms</u>: A fungal disease of the scalp and skin characteristically appearing as a flat red ring-shaped lesion spreading over scalp, feet or body.

<u>Mode of Transmission</u>: Direct contact with skin lesions of infected person; contact with contaminated articles of clothing.

Incubation Period: Usually 4 to 10 days.

Should your child present any of these symptoms, we recommend that you consult your family healthcare provider.

Any student presenting lesions will need to stay home from school. Students must have a note from a healthcare provider stating they are under treatment and lesions must be covered in order to return to school.

Head Lice

While lice are nothing more than a nuisance, it is important that children are checked on a weekly basis so that any head lice can be dealt with quickly and before they are allowed to spread too far.

As there has been an outbreak, we suggest that you check your child's head as soon as possible. Follow the simple CHECK, TREAT, COMPLETE routine below to ensure you are doing your bit to keep head lice outbreaks to a minimum.

<u>CHECK</u>

Your child's hair once a week. Use a proper nit detection comb — with teeth no more than 0.3mm apart to trap head lice. A good way to do this is smother your child's hair with conditioner and then comb through with the nit comb. It's more comfortable for the child, and easier to spot the nits. If you find live lice, consult a pharmacist for treatment advice. If head lice are spotted, take a close look at all the family, including yourself and ask close family and friends to check as well.

<u>TREAT</u>

Only treat if live lice are identified. Head lice are tough. They can't be killed by washing with normal shampoo or normal combing. Because they reproduce so quickly, you've got to kill them before they spread. If your child has head lice, check everyone in the family. You'll need to treat everyone affected to get rid of them. You can treat head lice by wet-combing hair with a special comb, or by using medicated lotions or sprays available over the counter at pharmacies or supermarkets.

<u>COMPLETE</u>

Repeat the treatment for a second time seven days after the first to kill any lice that may hatch from eggs during that time, if the pack instructions specify that a second application is required. Check that all head lice have gone within two to three days of the final application of head lice treatment to complete the process.
