Heroes/Heroines Drama activities

<p>Activity 1</p> 	<p><u>'Guess the Hero'</u> Mime your favourite hero or heroine. This means you are not allowed to speak. You could have categories eg. Superheroes/sports stars/celebrities/key workers. Ordinary people can be heroes too. Or sports stars. Even you! Get somebody in your household to guess which one you are. Then swap turns.</p>
<p>Activity 2</p> 	<p><u>'Hero hot-seating'</u> Play with someone in your family. Think of a hero or heroine. They need to ask you questions and you have to answer them pretending to be that hero. You can try doing their voice and moving like them too. They need to guess who you are pretending to be.</p>
<p>Activity 3</p> 	<p><u>Write a scene or a script from a heroic story</u> Watch this video to help you https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/topics/zsn4h39/articles/zx8kng8 You could use a one of the hot-seating characters from Activity 2, a real life story, a superhero story or your own made up story. <u>Beginning</u> - What happens? Who are the characters? Where is it set? <u>Build-up</u> - What happens next how does the story hint at a problem/ <u>Problem</u> - What is the problem within the story? <u>Resolution</u> - How does your hero fix the problem? Write your ideas down as a play script.</p>
<p>Activity 4</p> 	<p>Can you find things at home to use as a <u>costume</u> for a hero? Maybe you already have one. Can you dress up and role-play being that hero or heroine? Normally a hero does something to help or rescue others. Here are some ideas. Can you draw your costume too? If you've done Activity 3 maybe you could design the costumes for your play.</p>
<p>Activity 5</p> 	<p>You could draw a picture and design the different settings for your heroic story. You could also practise reading your script in the different characters and performing it to an adult at home with your costumes.</p>
