



Resource Base




to hold a coconut too!












Year 4

In year 4 history lessons, we begun our learning about Victorian London, by talking about the periods of history that we have already studied at school. We then worked out where the Victorian era fits onto our big class timeline. After this, we learnt about the significant events that happened during the Victorian era. We worked in partners to sort these events into chronological order and then added them to our Victorian Era timelines. We talked about which events we thought were the most significant.





In year 5 this week, the children have been reading The London Eye Mystery book. They have been researching main attractions in London, in order to create a leaflet using persuasive devices.







Year 6

In history, we were introduced to our learning for this half term, which is how World War 2





WHAT ARE THE RISKS? With more than two billion active users exchanging tests, photos, videos and documents as well as making voice and video calls, whatsApp is the world of most popular messaging cervice. To end-traend encryption only allows messages to be viewed by the sender and any recipients not even WhatsApp itself can road them. This privacy issue has been in the oppolight recently, as the UKS Online Saley Bill proposes to end such incryption on private messaging. EVOLVING SCAMS

WhattApp's popularity makes it a lucrative hunting ground for scammer. Recent examples include posing as the larget's child, requesting a maney transfer because of a sour-low 'emergency'. Flus a scam where traudsters trigger a wertication message by attempting to log in to your account, then (posing as WhatsApp) call or text to ask you to repect the code back to them plains then process.

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

To start a chat, someone only needs the mobile number of the WhatsApp user that they wont to message. If your child has ever given their number out to someone they don't know, that person could then contact them via WhatsApp. It's also possible that your child might be added to a group chat (by one of their friends, for example) containing other needs that they don't having other needs that they don't have

FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp's connectivity and ease of use allows nows to be shared rapidly — whether it's true or not. To combat the spread of misinformation, messages forwarded more than live times on the app new display a "forwarded mony times" table and a double arrow icon. This makes users aware that the message they be just received is far from an original _ and

CONTENT

The facility to send images or messages that can only be viewed ance has led to some WhatsApp users sharing inappropriate images or abusive texts, knowing that the recipient can't re-open them later to use as evidence of misconduct. People used to be able to screenshat this "disappearing" centent - but a recently added WhatsApp beature now blocks this, citing increased privacy.

CHAT LOCK

Another new aption offows users to store cartain messages or chots in a separate locked chots' folder, saved behind a possaced, ingerprint or face ID authentication. The risk here is that this function creates the potential for young people to hide conversions and content that they suspect their parents wouldn't approprie material.

VISIBLE LOCATION

WhatsApp's live location' feature lets users share their current whereabouts, which can be helpful for friends meeting up or parents checking that their child's safely on the way borne, for example. However, anyone in your child's contacts list or in a mutual group chair can also track their stranger, selectly a child's home defense or journeys that they make resultant.

Advice for Parents & Carers

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Encourage your child to treat unexpected messages with caution: get them to consider, for example, whether the message sounds like something a friend or relative would really send them. Make sure they know never to share personal details over WhatsApp, and to be wary of clicking on any links in messages. Setting up two-step verilication adds a further layer of protection to their WhatsApp account.

ADJUST THE SETTINGS

It's wise to change your child's WhataApp settings (go to 'Privacy', then 'Groups') to specify which of their contacts can add them to group chaits without needing approval; you can give permission to 'My Contacts' fixespt...'. Additionally, if your child needs to use 'live location', emphasise that they should enable this function for only as long as they need - and then turn it off.

THINKING BEFORE SHARING

Help your child to understand why it's important to stop and think before posting or forwarding something on WhatsApp. It's easy - and all too common - for content to then be shared more widely (even publicly on social media). Encourage your child to consider how an ill-judged message might damage their reputation or upset a friend who sent something to them in confidence.

CHAT ABOUT PRIVACY

Some parents like to check in with their child about how they're using WhatsApp, explaining that it will help to keep them safe. If you upot a 'lacked Chats' folder, you might want to talk about the sort of chats that are in there, who they're with and why your child wants to keep them hidden. Also, if your child has sent any 'view ance' content, you could discuss their reasons for using this feature.
