# Inclusion Coffee Mornings

The below coffee mornings have been scheduled for this academic year:

## Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> December, 9.00am-10.00am - Social Stories



Social stories can help children develop greater social understanding and help them stay safe. They are short descriptions of a particular situation, event or activity, which include specific information about what to expect in that situation and why. These stories help children feel less anxious, or help them understand what to expect or how to act in a given situation.

### Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> January 9.00am-10.00am – Social Skills

This workshop will be run by our speech and language therapists and will be particularly helpful for any children who have social communication needs. Parents will be able to develop an understanding of how to support a child with their social skills at home.

### Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> February 9.00am-10.00am – Family Hubs

Lewisham's Family Hubs are a new way of bringing together the advice and support a family may need, from pregnancy through to young people turning 19 (or 25 if they SEND). The Hubs will provide space to access support from professionals such as early years practitioners, health visitors, midwives, speech and language therapists and Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) advisors. Join our meeting to find out what services they offer.





Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> April 9.00am-10.00am — Language Development in the Early Years

This workshop will be run by our Speech and Language Therapists (Esther and Laura) and will support parents to understand how to develop children's oracy during their early years (ages 3-5).






# Year 2 Science












# Year 3 Maths

We reflected our roles as pupils and thought about what our responsibilities were. We agreed that everyone plays an important role in making sure that our school is a nice place to be.







# Year 5 History










# Resource Base Monster Making

# What Parents & Educators Need to Know about HORROR FILMS & AGERATINGS

The 'on-demand' availability of streaming platforms in many homes creates extra possibilities for young viewers to be exposed to aga-inappropriate content. Material which features horror or violence can cause anxiety and nightmares for children, especially since it can be hard for young ones to grasp that what they're watching isn't real.

#### CLASSIFICATION BREAKDOWN

The British Board of Film Classification has the following age ratings:

Ut Suitable for all ages

PS: For children aged 8 and above; this content shouldn't unsettle them

12A: Children under the age of 12 should not watch without an adult; this content potentially leatures bad language, multip at sexual references

15: Suitable only for 15-year-olds and above

18: Exclusively for an adult audience, with potentially assists themes of violence, mulity or see

# WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

#### STREAMING IS EVERYWHERE

Madem mobile devices make it very easy for children to eatch streamed films without the need for a TV. The evolubility of inappropriate content has risen eignificantly on streaming platforms, almost all of which hast 18-rated content. It not restricted by parental centrols, this could be viewed by children who aren't gate ready for such adult themes, concepts and imagery.

#### FACT VS. FICTION

Many children have no trouble separating fact from fiction. However, with modern day technology making pretend violence and honor look ever more nealistic, it's becaming harder for youngains to be! the difference. For instance, consider removes of sider films, where dated special effects (making it easy to discern that something wasn't real) have been replaced by far more



#### CHILDREN SCARE DIFFERENTLY

It can be difficult to decide what centent is appropriate for children. What's fine for one child could be extremely highbraing for another. As many children admit to not sharing or discussing the content they watch with their parents, encouraging an open dialogue around the kind of media that young people consume can help evoid exposing them to not be proposed to content.

## PEER PRESSURE

Friends encouraging each other to watch the latest film featuring violence or horror can feed to children consuming content that they're not ready for. As 18+ content is available on many streaming pictforms, youngsters can watch these together - potentially without that parents' or carers' knowledge.

#### PSYCHOLOGICAL IMPACTS

Horror prides itself on its ability to startle or induce genuine fear in the viewer – so it's no surprise that this genre land usually intended for children. A natural side reflect of this is that "jump scores" or a creepy, suspenseful atmosphere can have lasting effects on younger minds. The resulting anxiety can larger to relief themselves and the section anxiety.

# Advice for Parents & Educators

#### WATCH THE FILM FIRST

If you're concerned that a film might be unsuitable for children (whether it's their first dive into the honor game as a step up in age classification), then take a rock for yourself. There's no botter way to judge whather this content is comething you'd deem appropriate for a child - and if a parent, for example, has actually seen the lift of at least a partion of it), they can construct a far more credible case if they decide it's impropriate.

#### REMEMBER - IT'S NOT REAL

Emphasize to children that the content they're viewing is entirely lictional and has no chance of affecting them in real life, if a child is upset after watching a file, try to understand what exactly has unsettled them: this can help you approach the topic in a healthy and informative manner, to dispot any force or enteriories they may have.

#### DISCUSS THE CONTENT OF FILMS

If a child has seen a film that you think may have exposed them to potentially uncomfortable themes and ideas, don't sty away from talking about 1, and answer any questions they may have. This is expecially important if they watched the film without an adult present. Ask them to summarise the story for you, as this will give you an understanding of what they we known them westerling it.

#### USE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Most streaming platforms have the option to put age ranges on children's accounts. This means that films and shees that are inappropriate for children wan't be advertised while they're browning and lean't even appear if a child specifically searches for them. This can be changed any time at parents' discretion, but it's wise to protect these settings with a password, so a child can't alive anything on their own.









