Year 1 - Hanukkah Menorahs

In RE this week, year 1 learned about the Jewish festival of Hanukkah and the 'miracle of the oil'. Here are some of the amazing Menorahs we designed.



Year 1 Dance – The Nutcracker



This week in dance, Year 1 have continued a dance narrative of the Nutcracker ballet. They travelled to a magical land where toys come to life! Using large boxes the children could melt, explode, shrink and grow into a toy of their choice. We had soldiers, fairies, spiderman, teddys, aircrafts, spinning tops and dinosaurs. It was such good fun!









Year 2 - Trip to London Zoo

This week Year 2 had a fabulous time on their school trip to London Zoo! We did a lot of walking as we explored the 'Into Africa' part of the zoo. Throughout the day we saw a range of animals including hippos, giraffes, zebras, monkeys and even some tigers! The children and staff had a wonderful time.



Year 3 - River Trip

As part of our raging rivers topic, year 3 walked from Catford to Sydenham along the Waterlink Way. We saw lots of wildlife living peacefully in their natural habitat, including moorhens, ducks and a rabbit! Sadly, we noticed lots of litter strewn across the riverbank. Year 4 – Arctic Explorer

In Year 4 we have been learning about the Arctic explorer, Matthew Henson. He was the first American man to reach the North Pole, but his achievement wasn't recognised at the time due to the colour of his skin. In writing, we have been acting out scenes from his story, in preparation for a diary entry.



Year 5 – Freeze Frames

In class this week, we focused on different techniques to retell stories, and throughout the week, we explored how role-play can help us retell and remember "The Buried Moon." Specifically, we created freeze frames, a technique that allows us to freeze key moments from the story to help visualise and emphasise important parts.









Year 6 - Gymnastics

During our gymnastics lessons this week, Year 6 have been learning how to jump and travel across the equipment. We used a range of apparatus and passed through in a tuck, pike or arabesque. To add extra challenge, some children added rotation when dismounting from equipment.









Resource Base - Festival Celebrations

We have been learning about different festivals and celebrations. This week, we read the Christmas story and learned about the birth of Jesus. The children made their own stars of Bethlehem using lolly sticks which was very fiddly, but they showed great perseverance and created beautiful, glittery stars.



Evidence shows that children's spending habits begin to form as early as seven years old. With primary schools in England not required to teach financial literacy, many young people are reaching adulthood without knowing the basics of budgeting. This guide explains how to teach young people about money in a practical way, giving them the understanding to become savvy spenders and savers.

PROVIDE POCKET
