PROTECTION IN WAR

This week during our rights respecting assemblies, we have been discussing article 38 and Remembrance Day. Remembrance unites people of all faiths, cultures and backgrounds in honouring those who defend our democratic freedom and way of life. The UK has a long tradition of marking Armistice Day, calling to mind the moment when fighting ceased at the end of the First World War, at 11.00am on the 11th November 1918. We spoke about how children were affected by the war and how important Article 38 is in order to protect children in war.

Attendance Matters


At Torridon, we believe that every day matters in a child's education and encourage all children to attend school regularly and punctually. As you may be aware, the government has updated guidance for schools on attendance this year. There are two main changes of which you should be aware. The guidance states:

- 1. **'The DfE does not consider a need or desire for a holiday or other absence for the purpose of leisure and recreation to be an exceptional circumstance.'** This means that we are not able to authorise any absence for holidays. If you do need to apply for absence for other exceptional circumstances, please contact the office and complete and complete an absence request form.
- 2. 'Schools must consider whether a penalty notice for absence is appropriate in each individual case.' This means that, if your child has ten sessions (or five days) of unauthorised absence within a period of ten weeks, we are required to consider issuing a fine.

Reception – Let's Celebrate!



Year 1 - Diwali

This week, we investigated the Hindu celebration of Diwali. The celebration of Diwali marks the Hindu new year and means 'row of lighted lamps'. We learned the story Diwali and looked at some ways in which Hindus celebrate this festival. We made our very own Rangoli art using India's national animal, the peacock, as inspiration.



Year 2 – African Adventure

This week in Year 2, we have begun our exciting new topic – *African Adventure*! We kicked things off by reading the story *Meerkat Mail*, which follows the adventures of a curious meerkat named Sunny as he explores the African Savannah. Inspired by his travels, we wrote our own postcards to send to Sunny's meerkat family. We tried hard to use our senses in our postcard to detail what we could see, feel, smell and hear on our amazing safari adventure!



Year 3 – Live Ballet



Year 3 took part in an online Live Ballet lesson this week called "Discover Ballet". Led by dancers from the Royal Opera House, the children danced their way through a historical timeline of Kings and Queens from conflict to war using classical ballet.



During the introduction, children were taken on an online tour to the costume and prop department where they learnt about how items are made used by The Montagues and Capulets in the Romeo and Juliet Ballet.

The dancers were incredible, and learning some of the actions was lots of fun!

Year 4 - Science


As part of our science topic on digestion, the children in Year 4 had an excellent time making their own digestive systems out of items given to them. They had to think about which items would be best for which part, before building their systems and pushing food through it. It was messy but fun!







Year 5



In our reading lessons this week, year 5 have begun reading stories from all around the world. So far, we have read stories from Russia, Poland, Germany and Latvia. Our favourite story this week was a Polish story called '*The Shoemaker and the Dragon'.* In this story, people came from far and wide to slay a dragon that was terrorising the villagers.



Even the post strongest warrior failed and dies a fiery death. The village was saved thanks to a clever shoemaker.

Year 6 - Geography

Year 6 have started their new topic 'Human Settlements' by developing their understanding of what settlements really mean. They explored different types of settlements, and why people might choose to settle in certain areas. They gained a deeper understanding of how the physical and human features of a place might influence people's decision when looking for a place to live and work They went on to use atlases to identify the four capital cities, as well as different physical features on the UK map and plotted them on a blank map, using a key to explain their findings.

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Resource Base Learning

This week in the resource base we have been exploring mark making and drawing, using different media. The children had great fun making different patterns.





Allotment Club

Over the half term break our greenhouse was upgraded. The chapel roof was removed and a new corrugated roof was designed by Tom. We have insulated the walls and our greenhouse is finally watertight!

A huge thank you to Tom and Darryl for their hard work.



Allotment club worked at rapid speed to plant 200 bulbs into our new pallet planters to brighten up our playground come next Spring. The children designed signs from leftover pallet pieces too!

We still have 6 more planters to fill next week.



Times Tables Rock Stars Competition

As part of our commitment to make maths exciting and high profile in our school, we are taking part in a friendly competition involving schools in England. The competition runs from 07:30 GMT Tuesday 12th November 2024 to 19:30 GMT Thursday 14th November 2024. It's all done online via play.ttrockstars.com.

Children can play in any game mode with every correct answer to a multiplication or division question, earning themselves, their class and the school a point. The Times Tables Rock Stars platform will calculate the class average (the number of correct answers per pupil in the class who play during the competition hours, subject to a daily 60-minute limit (see below)). Winning classes in the school and in the competition as a whole will be the ones with the highest average.

To support player wellbeing, there is a daily time limit of 60-minutes per player. Once the player goes beyond 60-minutes of play on that day, they will still earn coins but will no longer earn points towards the competition. In the spirit of the competition, please don't play on their behalf but by all means encourage and support them!



10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators **ENCOURAGING CHILDREN** TO CHOOSE RESP

Sometimes, differences between children can escalate into bullying, potentially impacting their mental health in a way that can persist into adulthood. While it's natural to disagree sometimes, teaching children the importance of respect is essential – especially in difficult situations. This guide provides strategies for encouraging considerate behaviour, even during a dispute, to foster a kinder, more inclusive environment for everyone.

LEAD BY EXAMPLE

s adults, we play a crucial role in modelling spectrul behaviour for children: they observe and am from our actions every day. Be mindful of the ay you interact with others in front of children. Keep y you meract with anners in rous or charace. Reap inial that you should always approach others with attitude of mutual respect, even if you disagree It them. Demonstrating this behaviour can uence young people and help them to handle their n conflicts in a healthy way.

lake sure children know that it's fine to have differing pinions – and that disagreeing with someone loosn't mean you can't get along or respect each ther's point of view. Help them understand that ometimes we can 'agree to disagree'. Using active stening skills when doing this can also help to build empaty we durderstanding of diver. and understanding of others

PROMOTE ACTIVE LISTENING

ch children about the importance of active ning: that is, making a genuine effort to listen to other person's perspective without interrupting, are responding in a way that shaws you sestand their viewpoint, even (or perhaps ecially) if you disagree with it. This makes people i respected and allows for a better comprehensio of their point of view, which in turn can make it easier

ENCOURAGE THE USE **OF "I" STATEMENTS**

a child finds themselves in a disagreement with meane, it can be useful to encourage them to use "statements during the discussion. Framing their oughts and feelings using statements like "I feel..." "I think ..." can help them avoid an accusatory tone of encourages them to take responsibility for their un emploines.

FOCUS ON BEHAVIOUR, 5 NOT CHARACTER

When disagreements happen, encourage children to focus on critiquing and addressing the specific actions or behaviours that caused this upset, rother than attacking the person's character. For example, 'I dich't like how you interrupted me's better than "You're so rude". This can help children avoid hurting someone's feelings, which is likely to inflame the situation.

Meet Our Expert

The Anti-Bullying Alliance (ABA) co-ordinate Anti-Bullying Week each year. ABA is a unique coalition of organisations and individuals, working together to achieve their vision to stop bullying and create safer environments in which children and young people can live, grow, play and learn. They welcome membership from any organisation or individual that supports this vision and support a free network of thousands of schools and colleges.

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It's perfectly normal to feel upset durin disagreement – especially if it's getting Remind children that if they feel overvel should try to take deep breaths or even go for a short break to help them stay composed. If a conversation becomes too intense, remind them it's OX to suggest continuing it later or in a different setting. This can prevent things getting out of hand, allowing cooler heads to prevail.

START CONVERSATIONS ABOUT RESPECT

Talk openly to children about what respect means to you and to them. Discuss how they might show respect to each other, to friends, to strangers and even to people we might disagree with. You could examples of considerate or inconsiderate behavio u could u nce of giving others due regard
