
## Reception - Stickman




### No Pens Day




## Year 1 - Computing









## Year 3 - Rivers



Year 6 are preparing to write an action narrative. We have been learning about the importance of precise verb choices when describing an action sequence. We completed a shades of meaning where we ranked verbs and then carefully selected verbs to ensure we would be impacting the reader.







## Resource Base - Caring For Our Environment



It has been very windy this week! This year, we have been focusing on developing the children's independence and encouraging them to care for their learning environment. On Monday, we noticed that our outside area had been covered in leaves over the weekend. Before the children did any outdoor learning, we worked together as a team to tidy up by sweeping all of the leaves. The children did a fantastic job and even continued their efforts to



did a fantastic job and even continued their efforts throughout the week when they noticed more leaves.

## Forest School News

The Year 3 children have been supporting their learning about rivers by carrying out experiments at Forest School to understand the effects of erosion.



Rock erosion-the children used chunky chalk, water and a glass jar to discover changes when rock is disturbed by water. The children worked together to shake the rock in the jar once the water was added.





Wind Erosion-The children discovered that wind can change the effects of the soil. Using different consistencies of soil, they made mud castles. They used their own breath to attempt to blow the mud castles down!



Water Erosion- The children looked at how vast amounts of water can affect the surfaces it runs along e.g. rocks and mud. The children even created their own waterslide!



## Dance - The Little Match Girl



This term in dance, Year 4 are taking part in Sadler's Wells Digital Stage Education Project of The Little Match Girl. This week they have been exploring and creating choreography around the classic story with a twist!

This production by Ballo Arthur Pita was created for the stage and has been made into a film. Set in Italy, the production uses language, actions and unusual instruments to communicate the fable about family, friendship and hope.



This week Year 4 used the key themes in the story; cruelty, kindness and greed to create dance motifs, freezeframes, sounds and facial expressions.



# SNAPCHAT

Snapchat is a messaging app which allows users to send images, videos and texts to others. Its best-known feature is that anything sent 'disappears' 24 hours after it's been viewed; however, users are known to take screenshots or use another device to obtain a photo of their screen. In 2023, Snapchat added a chatbot function called 'My Ar

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

#### ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

My Al is Enapolat's new chatbot, which repties to questions in a human-like monner. However, the software is still in its infancy and has significant drawbacks, such as bissed, incorrect or misleading responses. There have already been numerous reparts of young users turning to Al for medical help and diagnoses, which could be inaccurate and therefore potentially dangerous.

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#### PREDATORS AND SCAMS

Predictors can exploit trappolar's disappearing messages by, for example, telling a user they have naked photos of them and will post them unless they're paid. Snapphat's own research found that \$5% of teanagers had superienced this - on this app or others. This likely isn't helped by "Snaphlape" - a feature which highlights your exact position in real-time. This is meant to help friends keep brack of each other, but could be used for more sinister reasons.

#### MY EYES ONLY

Snapchot has a hidden photo vault called

"My Eyes Only. Toens can conceal sensitive photos
and videos from parents and carers in this folder,
which is protected by a PIN. You can check for this by
clicking on the loon which looks like two playing cards.
This takes you to the "Memories" folder which stores
photos, stories and the Ny Eyes Only folder.

#### SCREEN TIME ADDICTION

Snapohat priorities user engagement, with features like streaks (messaging the same person every day to build up a high scene). The app also has sections called "Discover and "Spotlight", which show tollared content to each user. However, this could also be seen as an attempt to hook users into watching videos endiessly. Furthermore, constant natifications can lure people into using the app.

#### INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some content on Snapchat simply len't suitable for children. The hashings used to group content are determined by the poster, so even an innocent search term could still yield age-inappropriate results. The apps "disappearing messages" feature also makes it easy for young people to share explicit images an impulse – so seating continues to be a risk associated with Snapchot.

#### ONLINE PRESSURES

Although many of inopchat's filters are designed to entertain or amuse, the beautify effects on photos can set unrealistic body image expectations - creating feelings of inadequacy in younger users. Snapchat now also hav 'priority' notifications (which still get displayed even if a device is in do not disturb' mode), increasing the pressure on users to log back in and interact.

## Advice for Parents & Educators



Snapchat's family Centre' tots you view the dotable of the child's account their friends Sci and who they we spaken to in the last week – and report any opposents. You must irrefue a child to the Fornily Centre for them to join. So keep the child's location hidden on the app, go into settings and form on "Ohest Mode" and "Hide Live Location, and ensure they know not to share their location with anyone.

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#### **BLOCK AND REPORT**

If a stranger does connect with a child on Snapchat and begins to make them feet uncomfortable through builting, pressure to send explicit images or by sending sexual images to them, the child can top the three dots on that person's profile and report or block them. There are options to state why they're reporting that user – such as anneying or malicious messages, spam or macquerading as sameone eles.

#### FAMILIARISE YOURSELF

before you allow a child to download tragathat, download it yourself and familiarise yourself with the app. Snopchat has produced a parents" guide to the app to help you understand how it works and any protections they have in place. A link for this can be found in the sources below.

#### **ENCOURAGE OPEN DISCUSSIONS**

Stapphat's risks can be easier to handle if you nurture an open distrigue. For example, discuss My AT's responses to questions and how rollate they are. Talk about scame and blackmall before letting children sign up. If they he lured into a scam, encourage them to self you immediately. Talk openity and non-judgementally about sexting, emphasising its inherent risks. Furthermore, orbitain how popular 'challenges' on the platform can have harmful cansequences.
