












### Catford Broadway Theatre – Live Dance

#### Spring Bulb Competition Update



We had a lovely time sharing our favourite books with a partner from another class as part of World Book Day.




#### Resource Base - Learning About Autism








#### Year 2 - WANTED

### Year 3 Workshop - Clowns without Borders


We are delighted to let you know that our school is taking part in Primary Arts — a new creative, cultural programme for London primary schools from A New Direction. We have booked a touring session, and Clowns without Borders will be visiting us in school to provide an experience and workshop for children in Year 3 on Friday 14th March.

Children will take part in a performance of Piranhas and Bananas — a joyful interactive show that was developed with Rohingya children in Bangladesh in 2019. It's filled with playful storytelling, physical comedy, silly walks, and even sillier noises. Flip Flop is working at Flannagan's Fish Sanctuary. She has great ideas for the vegetarian piranhas, but no one listens. Flip Flop enlists the help of her friends in the audience, proving that even unexpected heroes can make a big difference!

Flip Flop is inspired by the imaginative ideas of children. They really help her out of some tight spots! She believes the world would be better if children were listened to more. The lively workshop immerses children in playful storytelling and physical comedy, encouraging them to recreate moments from Flip Flop's adventure. It explores who gets to make decisions, what it feels like to be listened to, and how we can listen to one another to help all voices be heard. We'll finish by showcasing the children's ideas on how their voices can be better included in school.

#### Year 4 Science - Sound

This week, in year 4, we learnt about how sound travels through a medium and into the ear. We learnt about soundwaves and looked in detail at a diagram of the ear. We then pretended to present an educational TV show in which we used the information we had learnt.







#### Year 5 - PSHE

This week, in year 5, as part of our 'Healthy Me' topic in PSHE, the students learnt an important life-saving skill—the recovery position. As part of their learning, the class explored why and how to safely help someone who is unconscious but breathing.





The lesson focused on ensuring that all students understand the steps involved in placing someone in the recovery position, allowing them to maintain an open airway and reduce the risk of choking.

Through practical demonstrations and hands-on practice, year 5 worked together to confidently learn and apply these skills, ensuring they feel prepared and empowered to act calmly and responsibly in an emergency situation.

#### Year 6 - Buddy Reading

During World Book Day, Year 6 joined the Resource Base and both Nursery classes for some collaborative buddy reading. They enjoyed bonding with the children, reading to them as well as listening to them read. This was a great opportunity for the oldest in the school to demonstrate responsibility and the core value of community — they did this successfully and the younger children were also fantastic!

# USING AND REVIEWING PARENTAL CONTROLS

Phones and computers are essential parts of children's lives, but with unfettered internet access comes a multitude of risks. While not foolproof, parental controls can help with this; filtering out inappropriate content, limiting the ability to spend real money, capping screen time and generally making devices safer for young people.

PARENT ACLESS

#### 1 KNOW THE TYPES

While parental control software can apply to an entire device, it also pays to know about options on individual apps and websites. Titles, for example, has Restricted Mode for similing useuitable videos, while Snapohat lets you keep an eye on who a child has been talking to. Check the settings of any new app young users want and review your options.

#### 2 COVER ALL DEVICES

Knowing what parental controls cover is enable, as remaining amovate can near the risk of blind spots in the device's safety measures. Controls on a phone will apply whenever a child's on that device, for instance - but you'll seen to ensure that parental controls are set up across any laptops, tablets and potentially other phones. too, Remembers, buying a new device may require you to set everything up again.

#### DON'T NEGLECT SHARED TECH

While children often have their own devices, if you have a shared family computer or studet, to example, you'll need to make sure that's not a seat point in your safety measures. Parental controls for your reuter, that cover everything connected to your thi-Fi, are one agtion — ar you can just be thorough with each device and online account, study and ordered that unprotected improse, phones and tablets are password leaders.

Even safe internet content can be harmful if it's viewed in excess.
